



"That one!" the young child exclaimed, giggling as the bored vendor handed the stuffed bear to her, a cheap red ribbon tied intricately around its neck, chocolate-brown fur covering its body, black eyes stuck onto the head, a stitched-on smile. Grasping her mother's hand, she happily skipped away from the stall, clutching the toy tightly to her.

Its eyes are falling off, the smile fraying, clumps of stuffing falling out of the sides, dirt ingrown over the body. Tiny pink embroidery across the ear – 'Victoria'. It smelled of mould, must and memories. What child's hands held this before me? Why was it here? It looked innocent and sweet, not deserving of being tucked away deep inside an attic, neglected and forgotten.

"Hey, Nat, how ya goin up there?"

"I, uh, I'll be down in a minute or two."

Tucking it into my shirt, I descend the steep ladder, giving a faint smile to my brother. "I didn't find anything. Let's just clear it out."

It would always appear somewhere out of place, always show up at the window when she was away at school. Her parents would hear giggles and loud thuds, smashing glass behind closed doors. When they'd walk in, she'd point to the bear, whom she named Victoria. "Victoria did this. Just ask her." Or, when they'd ask who she was talking to, she'd respond with; "It's just Victoria. Come on, talk to Mummy and Daddy." But the bear would lay silent and lifeless. 'It's just her imagination, a child's developing creativity,' they'd say.

I'm sure I put it in my closet, not my bedside table. I pick up my bag and head out into the living room. As I zip it up, I feel a crinkle. A small, crumpled, yellow sticky note;

"My old Mummy was bad. Can you be my new one?"

Over time, she grew tired of the dirty old thing, losing it deep inside her room somewhere. She slowly began to feel nauseous and unwell and found tiny notes randomly stuck over her things. At first, she blamed it on her younger brother, but then found one on her pillow after he had left home.

"Don't ignore me, you're a smart girl."

More notes are hidden on my bed, in my folded laundry, inside my drawer. A voice, deep inside tells me not to do it, but I open the closet door, searching blindly through the piles of clothes, suitcases and bags. I pull out the stuffed toy, wondering.

Its eyes flicker and spark. I run to the kitchen.



#### **Good for kid** good for life **Traditional Indigenous Game: Brajerack**

Backaround: Many different types of hide-and-seek games were played in Australia and the Torres Strait Islands. A game played in one part of Victoria in the latter part of the 1800s was called *brajerack* (the wild man). It was essentially a game of hide and seek whereby a player would hide in a wombat hole and would need to be dug out of this hiding place

Short description: A simple game of hide and seek, suitable for younger children



Players: Groups of four or more players Playing area: A designated area suitable to the activity

NSW Developed by Hunter New England LHD

Game play and basic rules • The brajerack hides in the playing area and the other players attempt to find him or her.

- Change around after the brajerack has been caught.
- Variations
  - Have a number of brajeracks. After three are caught a new game begins. Play at night using torches.
  - Play at night using torches.
    The brajerack hides somewhere in a hall or designated area and the to find him or her. finders only have 60 seconds to find him or her.
